LIONS DUES

- Council Policy Section 1. DISTRICT REVENUE. To provide revenue for approved district projects and to defray the administrative expenses of the district, an annual district administrative fund tax of \$2.50, which includes the \$.50 Convention Fund Tax is hereby levied upon each member of each club in the district and shall be collected and paid in advance by each club in two (2) semi-annual payments as follows: \$1.25 per club member on August first (8/01) of each year to cover the semi-annual period July 1 to December 31; and \$1.25 per club member on February first (2/01) of each year.
- Council Policy State Dues STATE AND DISTRICT DUES SECTION 1 The Oklahoma State (Council) Secretary in coordination with the State Treasurer will bill each Club no later than July 15 and January 15, for one half (1/2) year's dues based on membership as reported on monthly membership reports from LCI dated June 30 and December 31, respectively. Clubs need to remit invoiced dues to the State Office by August 15 and February 15. Clubs that have not paid their dues by August 15 and February 15 will be considered "not in good standing." (Article VII Section 1 State Constitution). SECTION 2 State dues are currently twenty-two dollars (\$22.00) per year. (Article VII Section 1 State Constitution).
- ► <u>International Dues</u>: These are paid to LCI at \$43.00 annually by your club Treasurer.





OK STATE DUES ALLOCATION

ARTICLE VII Multiple District Administration Fund

- To provide revenue for approved Multiple District projects and to defray the administrative expenses of the Multiple District, an annual Multiple District administrative fund tax of \$22.00 is hereby levied upon each member of each club in the Multiple District and shall be collected and paid in advance by each club in two (2) semi-annual payments as follows: \$11.00 per club member on September tenth of each year to cover the semi-annual period July 1 to December 31; and \$11.00 per club member on March tenth of each year, to cover the semi-annual period January 1 to June 30, with billings of the same to be based upon the roster of each club as of the first days of July and January, respectively.
- (a) PROMOTION FUND. Twenty-five cents (\$0.25) shall be placed annually in a restricted fund for the promotion of Oklahoma Lions' candidate for the International Board of Directors and that fund shall be carried over from year to year and be cumulative up to \$10,000.00. These funds shall be used for funding the campaigns of Oklahoma's candidate for the International Board and to provide elected International Board Officers from Oklahoma with friendship banners, pins, etc. The funds shall be expended by a vote of the Council of Governors or the Lions of Oklahoma in Convention. Funds above \$10,000.00 will be transferred to the Operations Fund
- by BUILDING FUND. Twenty-five cents (\$0.25) shall be placed in a restricted building fund and such funds shall be carried over from year to year and be cumulative. The fund shall be expended by a vote of the Council of Governors or the Lions of Oklahoma in Convention.
- (c) STATE CONVENTION FUND. One dollar (\$1.00) shall be used for the activities of the Lions of Oklahoma at the State Convention. The Fund shall be carried over from year to year and be cumulative and will be capped at \$10,000.00. Any amount in this fund above \$10,000.00 at the end of each fiscal year will be transferred to the Operations Fund.
- benefit the youth of Oklahoma in conjunction with Core 4 Grants from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). These monies raised through dues, or other outside sources, shall be held in a separate Lions of Oklahoma designated matching fund. This matching fund shall be carried over from year to year and be cumulative and will be capped at the match amount of the then current LCIF Core 4 Grant in effect. Disbursements from this Lions Quest Matching Fund cannot exceed the balance in the fund at the time requested by the Lions Quest Committee. At the expiration of the in effect LCIF Core 4 Grant for Lions Quest, excess funds above the specified match will be transferred to the Lions of Oklahoma Operations Fund. At such time as the Lions of Oklahoma cease their participation in the Lions Quest Program all monies accumulated in and designated for this fund shall be transferred to the Lions of Oklahoma Operations Fund and the Lions Quest Matching Fund will be closed.
- (e) OPERATIONS FUND. The remainder shall be used for the purpose of promoting the economic, cultural, recreational and educational advancement of the Lions of Oklahoma and will be disbursed as directed by the Council of Governors from this fund: Two hundred dollars (\$200.00) shall be remitted to each District Governor in attendance at the International Convention. Fifty cents (\$0.50) per member per annum shall be used for the activities of the Lions of Oklahoma at the International Convention, and twenty (\$20.00) shall be remitted to each current District Governor for each District Mid-Year Convention which they attend other than their own District.

We train and mobilize caring people to be able to easily and efficiently screen the vision health of our nation's youngest, dearest, and most vulnerable children.
- Oklahoma KidSight started in Oklahoma with a grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation (2013) and the Enbridge Foundation (2014). Under the leadership of Tom Cummings.
- Oklahoma City Community Foundation Grants have helped this program to grow since 2018.





ESSILOR VISION FOUNDATION AND LIONS KIDSIGHT USA FOUNDATION COLLABORATE TO EXPAND VISION SERVICES FOR CHILDREN

<u>The need</u> for this partnership is evident: Vision impairment is one of the most prevalent disabling conditions among children in the U.S.1 And while <u>80 percent of all vision impairment can be treated or cured, often with a pair of eyeglasses</u>, it is estimated that <u>10 million children ages</u> five to <u>18 in this country have vision issues and need vision care</u>.

This is a note from his teacher:

Look at him! Really looking, putting his head up to it, turning back to push buttons he missed! Before he used to just rub his finger around the area he thought the button was to find it.

It makes me heart smile.

The need is real!

- About <u>7-15% of kids screened 200,000 will be</u> <u>referred</u> for a follow-up exam by an eye-care professional.
- Approximately 5% of all children in this age group will have amblyopia, a treatable disorder that can result in permanently reduced vision when not addressed by an early age.
- The screening devices detect risk factors for amblyopia, such as strabismus (eyes that cross or wander out), refractive errors, and unequal vision between the two eyes, and potentially even more serious issues such as cataracts and eye cancer.

Vision Screener Certification is FREE

Lions KidSight USA strongly encourages Lions to become certified vision screeners so they obtain a comprehensive understanding of the screening process and then begin organizing events at Schools, Daycare Centers and Preschools.



disease.

Diabetic macular edema (DME) is the buildup of fluid in the macula. DME is a consequence of diabetic retinopathy and is responsible for about 50% of vision loss associated with diabetic retinopathy. If you are diabetic, you should receive specialized screenings on a regular basis.

These tests are called diabetic eye exams. There are no early symptoms in the early stages of retinopathy, which makes it difficult to diagnose prior to occurring symptoms unless an annual diabetic retinal exam is performed. Only half of patients with diabetes visit an eye doctor annually, which is sad because 95% of vision loss cases are preventable with early detection and treatment.





EYE GLASS RECYCLING PROGRAM


- Adopted in June 11, 2022 by the OLSF Board of Directors
